A MESSAGE FROM THE **Board Chair and Executive Director**





he old adage holds true, that time flies when you're having fun! It also starts to fly the moment a pandemic has been declared.

We are very pleased to provide you with an update on the work that your Cambridge & North Dumfries Community Foundation has been immersed in, and as you will see, this Annual Report summarizes work accomplished in both 2019 and 2020.

2019 continued to be a year of growth for us, and the total funds under management increased to more than \$13M. Investment performance was up considerably from 2018, and we ended 2019 with returns of 16.20% on endowed funds. 2019 was also the year we granted the highest amount in our history, with more than \$586,000 going to 116 charitable organizations. We are pleased and proud to include in this report both the numbers and the types of grants we disbursed in both 2019 and 2020, along with some highlights from local agencies.

In early 2020, when the COVID-19 pandemic was declared, and understanding that it would be impossible to bring together our community supporters, we reviewed our plans and sadly cancelled our Annual Mayors' Luncheon, our summer Buy Invitation event, and our annual Food for Thought Gala. Other initiatives soon presented themselves and staff and volunteers were kept busy raising funds for COVID-19 related challenges faced by community agencies, especially by those working on the front lines. Our Board of Directors made the decision to increase the 2020 fund disbursements from 3.5% to 4.5% in this difficult time, freeing up more funding for community organizations.

CNDCF is a proud partner in the collaborative work done in 2020 by the funding organizations in our region. We worked alongside the Kitchener & Waterloo Community Foundation, the Lyle S. Hallman Foundation, the United Way Waterloo Region Communities, Social Venture Partners and the Astley Family Foundation, to ensure that all who needed assistance could receive it. The initial push was on supplying PPE, and on meeting the immediate needs of the most vulnerable members of our community and the front-line staff who serve them.

CNDCF also worked in partnership with Kitchener & Waterloo Community Foundation and United Way Waterloo Region Communities on the disbursement of the Government of Canada's Emergency Community Support Funds. A joint Grants Committee was formed to review all applications to all three organizations, and again the focus

was on marginalized and racialized communities that have not traditionally received a fair share of available funds. There is no question that the COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted many areas where gross inequities have existed. CNDCF, though training of staff and volunteers, has had the opportunity to learn a great deal over the past two years, and we are pleased to report that we are now focusing an equity lens on our granting practices to ensure that no one is left behind.

Looking forward, we are also focused on increasing our endowed funds so we can continue to meet the needs of our rapidly growing communities. These are the cornerstone of the Foundation's ability to be a Forever Resource for generations to come.

The Foundation will also continue to focus on closer collaboration with the Kitchener & Waterloo Community Foundation and other funders. Leveraging our efforts with others will allow us to improve the quality of life for all members of our communities, and to meet tomorrow's challenges head-on.

Impact of Covid-19 on the Ontario non-profit sector

The COVID-19 pandemic has impacted our day-to-day lives in unprecedented ways. The Ontario not-for-profit sector is not immune to these impacts. In June 2020, the Ontario Non-Profit Network conducted a flash survey of 1,131 Ontario non-profits and charitable organizations. Their results paint a troubling picture for the future of the non-profits in our province:

- 1 in 5 survey respondents indicated that they may need to close their doors due to financial losses.
- 35% of respondents indicated they had to access their financial reserves, 22% resorted to pay cuts, and 10% used personal funds to meet the financial needs of their organizations.
- In June of 2020, financial losses from the respondents were estimated to be around \$90 million, or \$121,229 per non-profit organization.

These facts become even more troubling when considering that 40% of non-profits continue to experience an increase in demand for their services. An increase in government programs aiming to help Ontario's not-for-profit sector will help, but it likely will not be enough for many organizations to survive.

Now, more than ever, it is crucial that those who can afford to donate do so. We must rally around the less fortunate in our community to make sure the organizations serving them can survive these difficult times. Pivoting Community Programs

We congratulate our communitys organizations for their creativity and flexibility over the past year. A prime example of this is the Taming the Dragon program, created by the Family Counselling Centre of Cambridge and North Dumfries (FCCCND). The goal of the program is to encourage improved behaviour in the classroom and at home, by teaching students techniques to help them deal with anxiety.

Taming the Dragon typically scheduled in-person group workshops over a six-week period. In 2020, the pandemic caused FCCND to move their program to a virtual delivery system. This shift allowed the program to reach more children because therapists held virtual workshops with entire classes. The workshops taught four techniques to deal with anxiety, using craft supplies and handouts that were previously delivered to the school. A total of 492 children participated in 2020.

Feedback from participating school staff has been extremely positive, and other communities outside of Cambridge and North Dumfries have requested this program for their schools.

"Because of the pandemic, [student] stress and anxiety has increased substantially, and the demand for this type of program has quadrupled. We will continue to grow the program in order to reach as many children as we can."

Elizabeth Pavey English Language Learner Scholarship Fund

lizabeth (Libby) Pavey joined the Waterloo Region District School Board in 1977 and began her specialization teaching English as an Additional Language. There she formed strong bonds with the ELL team who also became her close friends at work through retirement.

Libby moved from elementary into secondary education and worked at Kitchener Collegiate Institute and then Galt Collegiate Institute, where she threw her passion into supporting her "New Canadian" students, coaching cross country running and serving on the steering committee for the 150th anniversary of the school.

Her helping nature led her to become a guidance counselor at GCI where she collaborated with her colleagues to set up the Careers Center and made sure that her students felt valued and were supported to reach their goals. She retired in 2001 after 32 years in education, the last 10 of those at GCI, to return to University where she completed her Masters of Social Work.

Following this, she returned to the WRDSB as a social worker, prior to her second retirement in 2006. In 2010 Libby was recognized with the YWCA Women of Distinction Award for voluntary, community and humanitarian service. Libby had an active retirement - volunteering, traveling the world, hiking, and spending time with friends and family. She passed away on April 25, 2020 from Alzheimer's disease.

To honour Libby's life her family established the "Elizabeth Pavey English Language Learner Scholarship", which is awarded annually to a graduating student from Galt Collegiate Institute, who is/was an English Language Learner and who is pursuing a post-secondary education. Libby was passionate about her students and so proud of what they were able to accomplish after leaving GCI.



The 2020 Elizabeth Pavey Scholarship was awarded to Wesley Cheung. Wesley attended GCI after moving

from Hong Kong to Canada with his family. While in Hong Kong, Wesley had learned English through mainly reading comprehension and writing, with little opportunity to practice speaking the language.

"As a student growing up in Hong Kong, I had always dreamed of pursuing my education in other countries." - Wesley Cheung

While attending GCI, Wesley quickly became a mentor to fellow English Language Learners (ELLs) by offering to help new students needing assistance with English. He became actively involved in various school activities, including DECA and Encounters with Canada. He

also was the MC at the first annual ELL Speech Competition. Through this experience, he showed other newcomers the strength and resilience needed to be on stage speaking in front of a huge audience (and not in his first language). Wesley applied for the Elizabeth Pavey Scholarship after being accepted to the University of Toronto, hoping he could "lighten the burden of the tuition fees for [his] family." At the University of Toronto, Wesley will be pursuing a degree related to international relations or political science. He would also like to pursue his master's and postdoctorate degree.

An Endowment is a Gift that Gives Forever

When you give to the Cambridge & North Dumfries

HOW ENDOWED FUNDS WORK

When you make an investment in an endowed fund, by contributing either to an existing fund or by establishing your own fund, your gift is never spent. Instead, it is invested, and a portion of the interest earned each year is disbursed to the community. We pool your gift and those of others in order to secure a higher return, and we also protect the value of your original gift by reinvesting a portion of the interest earned. Over time, through our careful stewardship and your continued support, your fund can become a game-changer for our community.

Setting up a New Fund is simple and can be accomplished in just two meetings. We encourage you to consider the best giving options for your specific objectives. Your professional advisor can help you with this too, and we'd be pleased to connect with him or her to let them know how we can work with them.

- You can make a pledge to reach a certain level of giving in a specific number of years, and then make contributions on a monthly or annual basis.
- You may be at a stage of life where you would like to prepare for a bequest to the Foundation. If this is the case, we will work with you to put in place the fund agreement that will ensure your wishes are

known. We can also disburse bequests to other charities for you, making this work simpler for your executors.

- You may be looking for a way to defray taxes, and we can help you to do this while also supporting your community.
- You can choose the way you want to make your gift, whether through a direct financial donation, the gift of an insurance policy, or of securities, to name just a few.

2019 Grant Highlights

Mom & Child Music and Movement Group

Women's Crisis Services of Waterloo Region ● Grant: \$1,500

WCSWR offers structured music and movement groups for moms, babies and toddlers. A music therapist leads the groups which focus on mom-child bonding and attachment. Classes offer a sensory-rich, gentle environment for infants and toddlers to explore new sounds, sensations, objects and movements. They offer a chance for moms and children to play while developing attachment through fun-interactive songs, instrument playing, and movement.



"I met Harry, the youngest of 10 children, who had a significant stuttering problem which often can be associated with experiencing trauma at a young age. During Harry's first music therapy session we began drumming together each on a jembe. It quickly became apparent that as Harry chanted short phrases in combination with his rhythmic drumming, his stuttering dramatically reduced. The look on his face as we both took notice of this was priceless. His mother also had tears as she recognized how this simple rhythmic technique could equip Harry with a way to speak without stuttering." — Music Therapist



High Five for Fiddlesticks Youth

Fiddlesticks Community Centre • Grant: \$1,500

Fiddlesticks has provided HIGH FIVE training to 18 youth in our community, so far, to ensure that their volunteer work will enhance and provide a higher standard of facilitation.

"Fiddlesticks has been working alongside a local foster parent to offer opportunities to a foster child in her care. This year 'Sophia' was able to participate in free High

Five training. As a result, this year she has gained the confidence and skills necessary to apply for a paid summer position with Fiddlesticks. Foster mom says that these opportunities have had a lasting impact on 'Sophia' and she is so grateful to CNDCF for their support of our work with youth." – Kim Fowler, Executive Director

Youth Musical Theatre Program

Drayton Entertainment • Grant: \$1,000

Drayton Entertainment's Youth Musical Theatre Program is an auditioned training program designed to develop a deeper appreciation for live performance. Students train with passionate industry professionals in singing, dancing, acting, audition technique and technical theatre. The curriculum is made up of repertoire drawn from popular Broadway shows and the week concludes with a showcase in the theatre auditorium for parents, family, friends and community members that presents what the youth have learned. The result is a child who emerges from the program with a greater sense of confidence, creativity and community.

Ayr Roots Program

Ayr Horticultural Society (North Dumfries Garden Club) • Grant: \$250

The Garden Club offers 5-6 workshops with 15 grade 3 students. The children create horticultural/environmental projects with materials provided by the club volunteers. These workshops provide an opportunity to develop an appreciation for nature, our environment and sustainability. Project examples are seasonal arrangements, planting a succulent dish garden, and building a bird house.

Avenue Road Baptist Water Work Bee

Reep Green Solutions • Grant: \$950

In June, 15 volunteers from the Fiddlesticks neighbourhood were brought together for a hands-on work bee to manage and treat stormwater run-off from the parking lot at Avenue Road Baptist Church. The work was completed by volunteers guided by a professional. The work done helped to improve the water flow through the rain garden to a swale. Participants were educated on how best to apply these techniques to implement green infrastructure on their own property and improve the overall water quality in the area.

"I was impressed by the design and function of the garden and the way it reduced the volume of water entering the pond and beyond. The concept is simple as it holds water back. This should be promoted widely in order to meet the demands of climate change." - Jack Hammer





SNA Summer Camp

Silverheights Neighbourhood Association • Grant: \$1,200

Silverheights Neighbourhood Association offered seven weeks of Summer Camp for youth ages 4-12. SNA offered a field trip and guest speaker every week and fun themed days like Water Wednesdays, Summerween, Fun Freezie Fridays and Christmas in July. Kids got to launch rockets, make boats, see exotic animals, a magician and paint tiles. Most importantly, the children established friendships and memories all summer long!



"Through the Kids to Camp funding we were able to provide Madina with two weeks of summer camp and she loved every bit of it. She was able to make friends, go on trips she has never been on, enjoy games and activities that helped make her summer great. 2020 Grant Highlights



Fruits of Hope

Knox United Church • Grant: \$1,000

Members of the community were invited to decorate their front lawns, balconies, or porches with messages of hope and encouragement during the pandemic- then the map of the route was shared so all the community to view and vote on categories.

"One person at the presentation of the ribbons asked if we could do this event again next year, even if we have beaten the virus! She felt it truly brought all ages of the community together. OK2BME

KW Counselling Services • Grant: \$1,900

Research has shown that LGBTQ2+ folks in Waterloo Region have a lower sense of belonging, often do not feel safe in public spaces, and want LGBTQ2+ specific community supports. KW Counselling services received funds to sustain their OK2BME Youth Group in Cambridge from January to April 2020.





This group helps LGBTQ2+ youth in Cambridge experience an increased sense of belonging and a decreased sense of isolation. The youth group in Cambridge meets biweekly, providing a safer space for LGBTQ2+ youth to meet other youth. KW Counselling Services recently partnered with Canadian Centre for Gender and Sexuality Diversity and Plan Canada to support the youth participating in Gender Equality Dialogues. The youth where able to provide an LGBTQ2+ perspective that fed into national and international perspectives on Gender Equality.

The group has a large ripple effect on its members' lives. It has provided youth with meaningful leadership and recreational opportunities, which have translated into genuine friendships and youth feeling less isolated. KW Counselling services hopes there has been increased inclusion, acceptance and belonging on a community level.

"The group was very meaningful to me... it symbolized the huge amount of progress our community was making in terms of having out and visible people. We managed to discuss a lot of issues and I learned a lot about what it means to be gueer and how to build community." - Youth Group Member

Pop-up neighbourhood programs

Fiddlesticks Community Centre • Grant: \$2,050

The Fiddlesticks Community Centre operated the pop-up programs throughout their neighbourhood. This gave children and youth the opportunity to have some socially distanced recreation and social time in a safe, COVID-friendly environment.

Pop-up programming consisted of four mini events per day, one hour long each, at four different parks within the neighbourhood. Our camps operated in a 'family grouping' cohort model. Each group consisted of seven or eight children and two staff. These camps were held 100 % outdoors.

Pop-up Programs

Nutrition 4 Learning • Grant: \$1,000


Nutrition for Learning created a pivot option of Pop-up Programs to supply student nutrition programs for students who normally rely on school programs. The pop up alternative program has a ripple effect of a feeling of community when the children can have food of their own during the week as something special.

7 weeks of Summer Camp in a Box

Alison Neighbourhood Community Centre • Grant: \$2,400

Because of health and safety concerns due to COVID-19, The Alison Neighbourhood Community Centre was unable to run their in-person Summer Playground program. Instead, they pivoted the program by offering 7 weeks of Summer Camp in a Box, delivered to each family's home. Each week of boxes had a different theme and included materials and equipment for a craft, an art activity, a sport, and an outdoor activity. Over 200 boxes were delivered over the 7 weeks. They also launched a "Freezie Truck" program that connected them to the whole community on a weekly basis. Every Monday they drove through the streets of their neighbourhoods and handed out freezies to children.

"During the pandemic, I was workina long hours as a nurse. Having the summer boxes for my children has been a wonderful resource and support for my family. They helped me worry less about my children being bored during the day while I was at work for long hours." - Parent of a Participant

Virtual Summer Camp and Summer Adventure Boxes

Greenway Chaplin Community Centre • **Grant: \$3,500**

Greenway Chaplin Community Centre ran 9 weeks of virtual summer camp with two videos being released daily. They created Summer Adventure Boxes to accompany these videos. The boxes were filled to the brim with supplies for families to follow along with the videos, as well as complete additional activities. A duo-tang full of activity instructions that could be completed by campers on their own time was also provided. Every Tuesday, campers had the opportunity to participate in community challenges where they could work together with family and friends to do a task together. Campers participated in a Fun Friday on Friday afternoons with staff members over zoom. The last week of camp had a Music and Dance theme, where campers had the opportunity to explore different kinds of dance and musical instruments from around the world.

Percentage of 2019 & 2020 Grants that addressed each Sustainable Development Goal












